PROJECT UPDATES: We continue to make progress on the various projects at Trinity Pines. The office expansion will get the new metal roof this week and the contractor is scheduled for the installation of the hardie board around the entire Conference Center. The HVAC contractor indicates that he should be wrapping up and conducting a test of the new AC system in the near future (no more swamp coolers!). The cold roof installation continues with a great deal of effort because of the height and incline of the building. We are thankful the fall weather has held steady up to this point. Anthony Henry, Assistant Manager, is coordinating all of these projects. There are still several things on the drawing board - new steps at the west entrance to the Conference Center, paving of the parking lot, and wrapping of the poles on Phase I and Phase II of the Conference Center improvements. We anticipate the fire sprinkler installation in the office area very soon which will allow for insulation and then sheetrock (we hope to have some volunteers to help hang the sheetrock - let us know if you have experience and are willing to be on the list for this project) and then we will have taping and texturing to complete the interior. Our hats are off to the members of the Camp Property/Development Committee who have been very faithful during this time to make decisions and keep the projects moving.

CAMP PROPERTY/DEVELOPMENT: The Camp Property/Development Committee welcomed back to their committee former member, Lowell Rowley, Caldwell Canyon Hill, who took a leave of absence during health issues with his wife. Lowell Rowley was one of the first people to do any work on the current site as he prepared and laid the entire infrastructure with roads, utilities, etc. in the early days of occupancy. At the time, Lowell and his son owned an excavation company and he played a vital role in helping to establish the layout of Trinity Pines.

The committee also welcomed a new committee member, Roger Pipkin, Eagle Christian and Nampa First Church. Roger is very involved with the scouting program at Nampa First and has invested many hours into the scouting facility at Trinity Pines.

WHIT BARTLOW

I was sitting in a Camp Personnel meeting last week when I learned that Whit Bartlow had moved from this earth to his heavenly home. While I tried hard to concentrate on the agenda for the meeting, my mind kept wandering back to the time in 2000 when we moved from Victory Cove to Trinity Pines. It was then I met Whit Barlow, Bethel Nazarene, for the first time. This man with a farm truck and a very large flatbed trailer with handmade, plywood sides showed up to say, "Let's git-r-done." I would have no idea how many 27-mile trips Whit made in a 2-3 week period. He never complained, he never turned in a bill for fuel, he never asked, "How much longer will this task take?" Unless you were involved with the relocation effort you may never have known the vital role that Whit played. My personal reward was that we would have dinner together. I heard the stories of his farm in the Palouse; I learned about his family, kids, and grandkids; and I learned about his love for the Lord. Whit loved to tell jokes and stories and even though I was dog tired from the day's move, he could still make me laugh.

That move created a long lasting friendship. I never visited Bethel or crossed paths with Whit that he did not have a funny comment related to the time we spent moving the camp "stuff." He found humor in almost everything and was never short on advice. I continued to benefit from Whit's wisdom, insight, and support even after Trinity Pines was up and running. He frequently wrote me notes, sent his financial investment for camp with either a joke or bit of advice. Our conversations always started the same: "How's that camp?" Whit did not have a quiet voice and usually his inquiry would gather people in a 20-foot radius to come and listen. Then he might conclude by saying, "Are kids being saved?" My response would bring that quirky little smile across his face that I have come to cherish and then a quick pat on the back and something like, "Well, it is a good thing we moved all of that junk from McCall.

I missed his memorial service because I was at camp and, like I told the family, Whit would want it no other way. He would want me staying by the "stuff" to keep things moving. A personal loss for me but a great gain in heaven for a saint who was well-traveled and vested in Trinity Pines.
